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Message from the Chair

The results presented in this Annual Report show that the Canadian Institute for Research on Linguistic Minorities (CIRLM) meets a real and relevant research need for Official language minority communities (OLMC). However, does it also live up to the expectations held by research stakeholders and OLMC? We can let the results presented in this Annual Report speak for themselves, but when an external evaluation is carried out, based notably on consultations with partners and representatives from the research community, the conclusions support the CIRLM's assessment of its activities. They enable us to rightly appreciate the adequacy between the results and the community's expectations.

The Department of Canadian Heritage conducted a formative evaluation of the CIRLM after its fifth year in operation. At its request, the evaluation was carried out by *Kelly Sears Consulting Group*, which concluded that as a whole, the people consulted were satisfied with the work accomplished by the Centre. It notes that "The research and networking activities have enabled the Institute to reach its main goals: become a national centre of expertise that carries out, supports, and disseminates research projects whose results lead to an improved understanding of the issues that influence the development of Anglophone and Francophone minority linguistic

communities¹" (Unofficial translation). This evaluation is an excellent tool for the CIRLM to learn the perspectives of its partners and the representatives of the research community. The analysis shows that the Centre must reconcile the community's expectations with the university's expectations by producing independent research, while meeting the needs of both communities for practical knowledge. The objective remains however to use the findings that emerge from the evaluation to improve how the CIRLM operates and performs. The Consulting Group has formulated a few recommendations along these lines. Among others, the CIRLM will have to improve its promotion of the activities organized by all of its team members among its stakeholders.



The report tends to confirm that the CIRLM is leading the way in bringing people together and in creating the right conditions to further research on official languages. With its network of active researchers and productive partnerships, the CIRLM has succeeded in multiplying its activities. Its research activities have contributed to clarify issues regarding the development and the progression of OLMC in Canada as well as raising awareness among the Canadian

population of the reality in which these communities live.

In addition, another firm evaluated the financial situation of the CIRLM. The result, which takes into consideration the current economic context, advised the CIRLM to manage its finances carefully in the years to come. This will make it possible for the CIRLM to sustain its research developments.

Finally, I want to underscore the quality of work performed by Mr. Rodrigue

Landry, Executive Director, and his team. Together they have created the conditions and gathered the resources needed to carry out the CIRLM's mission.

Message from the Executive Director

It is with great pleasure that I present you with the 2008-2009 Annual Report. This has been a year filled with assessments at the Canadian Institute for Research on Linguistic Minorities (CIRLM). After five years in operation, the Department of Canadian Heritage carried out a formative evaluation of the CIRLM. It will be very useful to learn, among others, the expectations and perceptions of the groups that deal with the CIRLM regarding its activities and accomplishments. The Centre and its Board of Directors will closely look at the evaluation report in order to improve its results. However, it is already possible to note the positive conclusions that have emerged. In all, the CIRLM satisfies the expectations regarding the research quality of its results. The report's recommendations will enable us to further improve the Centre's performance.

This year, the CIRLM has been able to consolidate its activities and projects. The Centre continued and finished the projects it began according to the agreements reached with clients, notably those for the omnibus agreement with the Department of Canadian Heritage. Several projects were also carried out with the *Consortium national de formation en santé* (CNFS), the Canada Millennium scholarship Foundation, the N.B. Department of Education, the *Office québécois de la langue française*, Quebec Community Groups Network, and the Office of the Commissioner of Official

Languages. At the Research Data Centre, we have begun the first research projects, notably the analysis project regarding the postcensal survey on the vitality of official-language minorities. The results of this survey will be all the more relevant to help shed light on the stakes (regarding vitality) that underpin the development of OLMC. After two years in operation, we will check the status of the RDC for the years to come so that it may be sustained in Moncton. Due to the number of projects at the RDC, we are considering giving it the status of a part-time Centre. Furthermore, to reduce operating costs, the centre will be turned into a satellite centre and linked with another RDC.



The CIRLM also created and improved its research network in Quebec to expand research on Anglophone communities in Quebec. The Quebec English-Speaking Communities Research Network (QUESCREN) was officially launched in April 2009. It was created thanks to a contribution by the Department of Canadian Heritage and Concordia University where its coordinator-researcher works. This network of researchers seeks to increase interest in research relative to Anglophones as well as improve efforts toward this goal.

In other respects, the omnibus agreement enabled the creation of a bibliographic database on official languages, which will be made public in the summer of 2009. In this way, the CIRLM meets a need expressed by researchers and



stakeholders to have access to a database of research concerning official languages. Projects within the scope of the omnibus agreement are added to others as you will see in the 2008-2009 Annual Report. The year ended just when the proceedings for the first *Biennale Amérique de la langue française*, organized by the CIRLM in 2006, will be published in the summer of 2009. In addition, the proceedings for the second Forum on research relating to the health of French-speaking minority communities were ready to be published in the fall of 2009. Published in *Francophonie d'Amérique*, these publishing projects strengthen our collaboration with this journal. Thus, the Institute helps bring researchers together and contributes to the dissemination of their work. Take for example the numerous publications and papers stemming from the work accomplished by its researchers and associate researchers.

In 2008-2009, the CIRLM sat on several strategic committees for research on OLMC and their vitality. It is still a member of the *Commission conjointe de recherche sur la santé* and of the CIHR Committee on official languages. It participates notably in activities that ensure the continuity of the *Sommet sur les communautés francophones et*

acadiennes organized by the FCFA. In a research environment that is expanding and becoming increasingly structured, the CIRLM is playing its role of leader by acting as a link between university, community, and governments. The Institute thus seeks to build bridges and develop partnerships to ensure research synergies that will promote knowledge transfer.

In the end, I want to underline that our accomplishments would not be possible without the commitment of the Institute's team members and network of associate researchers who collaborate on different projects. Such a strategy of partnerships and network of associate researchers inevitably gives results. I particularly wish to thank Hélène Gallant, the Institute's Administrative Assistant, for the quality of her work and administrative support.


Program Committee

The CIRLM helps students gain valuable experience and training in research. In 2008-2009, a total of 16 students were hired to take part in research projects.

The CIRLM has launched 32 research projects, including several projects undertaken in partnership with other research centres and community organizations.

Thirteen research projects have been completed on family, childhood, education, community vitality, health in minority communities, and the OLMC law, governance, and public policies.

There are also 19 other ongoing research projects on the following themes: art, culture, identity, and diversity; family, childhood, and education; community vitality; health in minority communities and the OLMC law, governance, and public policies. These projects involve academic and community partners.

In addition to these projects, two proposals were recently put forward and four proposals were rejected.
